



Torske Klub Meeting Notice April 12, 2003 Annual Father / Son / Daughter Event


Dear Torske Klub Member,



When in Norway, Beware of the Tipsy Moose

Animal experts are warning that unusual weather in Norway has led to groups of drunken moose wandering around the forests. Many Norwegian moose are becoming intoxicated after eating large numbers of fermenting fruit, which were plentiful after the country's exceptionally warm summer.

According to local sources they could pose a threat to humans. A Norwegian veterinarian says it's the first time he's heard of moose getting drunk. He assumes they behave in the same way as drunken humans: Some become harmless, while others are the total opposite.

Animal control officials have warned people to beware of drunken moose. "Be careful when you approach moose that have been munching apples for days. Their behavior can alter, and they can become frighteningly aggressive. Clap and see how it reacts. If it doesn't retreat but instead comes even closer, by all means stay vigilant.
