### Stave Churches

One of the fascinating aspects of Norway are the collections of an-

cient churches that are scattered across the country. They are a reminder of the basis and transformation of the Christian faith of our ancestors. The origin of these buildings trace to the Viking age, even though many are still in use a millennium later. The structures combines those Viking elements & those of the early catholic church of Norway. It binds them with the transformation of the protestant reformation

They are called stave churches (stavkyrkje in

Norse) because of the timber posts in the central support of the build-

ing. This was covered with planks. The Lomen building has Norse gods carved at the top of the posts as their punishment to support the ceiling for eternity because of their

role as false gods.

These ancient

churches have survived 1000 years, but are more at risk today than ever. Although their value as cultural icons have granted them status as worthy to preserve, threads of vandalism and fire still loom to destroy them.

One of the four "stave" posts supporting the structure can be seen behind the pulpit.
