### Thanksgiving 2017

The Halloween "Holiday" has past by the time you get this letter. Although the ubiquitous countdown to Christmas has started, whether we want it to or not, our focus this month should be on Thanksgiving (other than those temporarily excused for the annual deer hunt and the seasonal football activities).

Thanksgiving Day, of course, is a public holiday celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November in the United States. It originated as a harvest festival, but Thanksgiving has been celebrated nationally on and off since 1789, after Congress requested a proclamation by George Washington. It has been celebrated as a federal holiday every year since 1864, when, during the American Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Fa-

ther who dwelleth in the Heavens," to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. Together with Christmas and the New Year, Thanksgiving is the opening act of the broader fall/winter holiday season.

In most of our memories, the holiday has transitioned from one of family gathering and thanks to the start of a race for commodities as the day after Thanksgiving has as much or more recognition as the day itself. It make me wonder if we are off the track.

For me and others, it is a good time to renew and return to those traditions. Joy Fisher, a Baptist Christian writer, states that "this holiday takes on a spiritual emphasis and includes recognition of the source of the blessings they enjoy year round — a loving God."

I agree. And thanks to you for reading this.

The celebration of Thanksgiving in Norway differs. In name, it's nearly the same: Høsttakkefest translates directly to "Harvest Thanksgiving Feast." But its roots are older and reflect both religious and secular tradition.

The religious roots of Høsttakkefest predate the adoption of Christianity in Norway. In the ancient city of Chonae, on September 29, 380 AD, according to the western liturgical calendar, a church was consecrated to the Archangel Michael. With time, that date was celebrated in the Catholic Church as Michaelmas, spelled Mikkelsmess in the Nordic countries. In medieval Europe, it became associated with the harvest at the end of the farming year. So in Norway, the annual Høsttakkefest was held along with Mikkelsmess or on a Sunday before or after it. In 1770, Mikkelsmess was abolished as a public church holiday in Denmark and Norway. In 1918 Mikkelsmess was reinstated in the Norwegian liturgical calendar, and from 1999 on, its celebration is optional in the Church of Norway. Today Norwegian calendars annotate September 29 as Mikkelsmess.
